1.4 Whether there is any revision/update of regulation or syllabi, if yes, mention their salient aspects.

Revision is made and the course title is changed from M.Sc Animal Science to Zoology. Revision is done once and modified the eligible as per BoS suggestions.

(i) The core course has been made equal credit; (ii) Traditional concepts of practical course has been introduced (as two practical each for Physical, Inorganic & Organic) (iii) Over work load on odd semester has been equally distributed in both the semester.

The department has been conducting Board of Studies once in three year to update the curriculum. Next BOS

is planning to conduct very soon. In order to review the course syllabus of M A Economics programme the board of studies meeting was held on 13-14th December 2017. Revisions are planned, which will be placed in the next Board of Studies. There is a general perception among students that the course content is quite heavy. So the Department is considering reducing the number of texts for core reading – both in the hard core and elective courses. Syllabus was revised by Board of Studies. Board of studies conducted & Syllabus changed according to UGC NET & Higher Education Examinations & Competitions. YES, Addition of a Course on Indian Studies for Foreign Students, in lieu for Second Language Paper. Syllabus has been revised, Introduced a new course on IPR and subject has been revised. 1. Each subject updated. 2. Two new elective course introduced. i) Forensic linguistics. ii) Academic writing

Major decisions taken by the BoS meeting held on 3rd March 2018.

1. The BoS unanimously decided to change the existing Inter Disciplinary Course entitled “Governance in Kerala: Innovations and Experiments (Course Code 425) with a new course titled “Rural Governance in Kerala”. The BoS also approved the Syllabus of the said course. It will take effect from 2018-19 sessions onwards.
2. Further, the BoS resolved to start Internship in the 3rd Semester of MA (PA&PS) from the Academic Year 2017-19 Batch, The Department will identify various administrative institutions and offices for it. The period of Internship is two weeks.
3. Resolution passed by the BoS dated 10.04.2018, states that “the Foundation Course and Interdisciplinary Course can be redesigned as Core Courses of various Courses. Hence all the existing students who have appeared for the Semester Examinations, their results may be amended by incorporating the new Course Code. Hence, the CoE may be requested to issue a corrigendum of the results already published and Grade Cards issued with new Course Codes accordingly.

The program was started in March 2016 and the first Board of studies was conducted in June 2017.

 Topics covered in the class are given for seminar presentation which will be helpful for both slow and fast-learners
 Students are asked to submit self prepared notes on topics covered in previous days, which help students to become up to date with the progress of course.
 The teaching – learning process is mainly based upon student centric approaches where students' involvement in the learning process is ensured. Lecture cum demonstration methods, drawing on case studies, anecdotal evidences, field based teaching , hands on methods and situational analysis.

 The courses in the program are interdisciplinary in nature and hence the methods adopted vary with each course.

In general, our courses are delivered through classroom lectures, student seminars, group activities and community visits. In order to enhance the research aptitude and update their knowledge in recent developments in public health research, we have a journal club, where presentations are conducted by students. We engage the students in field based learning where students carry out practical assignments in community settings such as in-depth interviews, observations and group discussions; and visit institutions of public health relevance so as to facilitate learning through observation. A few students who are in-service health professionals share their practical experience as an employee/insider of the health system, to stimulate the discussions/learning process. The interdisciplinary profile of the students brings in different perspectives on a specific topic during the discussions.

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Curriculum is annually revised with recent trends and developments in the area; also incorporating the suggestions from eminent scientists and professors who are the part of Board of studies of the department. Feedback of curriculum is also collected from renowned scientists of national and international status and their comments and suggestions are incorporated. Student feedback from passed out Alumni are also taken in to consideration in the curriculum revision.

The department evaluates the student feed-back to improve teaching, syllabus revision, and

delivery methods. The outgoing students were asked to give proposals for any necessary changes in the syllabus. Every academic year, the faculty council of the department meets and proposes necessary changes in the curriculum and syllabus based on the input received from alumni, industry, faculty (national/international) and on-going students.

The Department of Economics revised its PG syllabus in the Board of Studies meeting held during 13-14th December 2017 by incorporating recent trends and development in the field of economics, which helped the students to enhance their capabilities to enroll at reputed national level universities, centers of excellence and to get placed at different organizations. The former students of the Department succeeded to get enrolled for higher studies & research at various institutions of repute.

Curriculum was developed for the department in the year 2016-17 and it is intended to revise every year with the feedback from external experts, faculty and students. Teaching and Learning Feedback on the teaching is sought from the students for each courses and learning is evaluated based on the student performances in assignments, internal exams and group work for the respective courses.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

In addition to conventional class room teaching practices, our faculty also adopt interactive teaching methods that motivate students for self-learning. Classes are taken interactively with active student participation. Student seminars are conducted as part of courses which are beneficial for both fast and slow learners. Seminars from fast learning students will be benefit slow learners; on the other hand, slow learners will also develop presentation and communication skills along with gaining better understanding of the concepts. Class assignments are mainly problem/application oriented which test the student's understanding of theoretical basics and improve the problem solving skills. Through the above activities students also get equipped for

state and national level competitive examinations.

We follow choice-based credit system for M.Sc. The department offered elective courses by giving preferences to student choice. , We follow, chalk and black board, power point lectures, multimedia presentations, white-board and marker pen, videos, paper discussion, Student Presentations, in class and take-home assignments. We follow continuous assessment and end semester exams to evaluate the student performance. During the last semester each student is required to carry out a project work under the supervision of a faculty member of the Department. However, a student may also opt to pursue his project work in a reputed industry/institution with the consent of Department/Institute. In such cases, the department must look into the suitability of the projects and assign one internal guide/supervisor. The internal supervisor shall monitor progress of the student continuously.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

A minimum of two tests per subject are conducted in addition to the assignment and seminars in each course. In practical courses, as part of the continuous assessment, theoretical understanding of the experiment, performance skill, accuracy and precision in measurements etc. of the students are scrutinized and constantly evaluated. End Semester examination answer scripts are evaluated by both department faculty and an external supervisor. This double-valuation ensures the quality. We follow continuous assessment and end semester exams to evaluate the student performance. The department follows CBCS system for the evaluation of students. Unit tests, assignments & model examinations are conducted as part of internal assessment prior to end semester examinations.

We do have existing informal research collaborations, which will be utilized for future grant applications. Students are formally trained to undertake individual dissertations.

6.3.4 Research and Development

Department faculty are carrying out independent and collaborative (national and international) research projects in diverse areas such as cancer, infectious diseases, stem cells, industrial-heterogeneous catalysts development, organic chemistry, surface chemistry, polymer chemistry, nanoscience, computational chemistry, supramolecular chemistry, dye sensitized solar cells, ultra-fast electron and energy transfer reactions, catalysis and CO₂ capturing etc. Several of our faculty members have funded research projects from DST/DST-SERB, UGC, KSCSTE, DBT and ICMR. 12 PhD students have been newly joined in the year 2016; thus a total of 15 students are working for PhD in the department. In addition, each faculty member guides MSc students for their project work which is a part of the MSc curriculum.

Altogether 22 papers have been published by department faculty in the year 2015-2016. The department has organized training workshop and national seminars for teachers and students. Several faculty members have participated and/or presented their work in conferences, seminars and workshops of national and international status

The Department course structure has been specialized in the area of intelligent system. During the academic_year the Department has organized many scientific programs to motivate the student and scholars in the area of study and research.

The Department of Economics offers research opportunities in various relevant areas such as development economics, human development, poverty and deprivation, international trade, environmental economics, industrial economics, energy economics, welfare economics, fiscal economics, monetary economics, labor economics etc. which help to strengthen university-community linkage by providing, perceptions, options and practical solutions to the problems at the grass root level.

Department has good infrastructure with several sophisticated instruments such as UV-Vis and IR spectrophotometers, DSC-TGA analyser, CHNS analyser, Atomic absorption spectrophotometer, Spectrofluorimeter etc. along with several minor equipments necessary for teaching and basic research works. Students get hands-on training on various sophisticated instruments which improve their analytical skills. The instrument services are also made available to the sister departments of the university.

The Department course structure has been specialized in the area of intelligent system. During the academic year the Department has organized many scientific programs to motivate the student and scholars in the area of study and research.
